What makes this series so valuable is that each Bible event leads the reader or the group to discover the deepest truths of the Bible for themselves. This is done through insightful multiple choice questions which draw the readers to enter into the story and find for themselves its meanings and implications which they then can apply to their own lives.

The series is best "taught" by persons who encourage the group to do most of the talking and thinking. The teacher best acts as a leader in which the group discovers its way through the Scriptural events. The teacher may help the group when he or she believes that valuable truths have been overlooked, but the first discoverers should be members of the group itself. This stirs tremendous interest on the part of the group. This also relieves the teacher of the responsibility, under older systems of teaching, to carefully master all the truths of the text and present them in a way that would hopefully interest and "teach" the group.

Almost all teachers report that their classes or groups show much more interest than before and that teaching this series is much easier than it was under the older systems of teaching.

Individuals who use these lessons for their own personal study find this investigative method interesting and meaningful. The reader is invited to sense the drama of each story in his or her own Bible and be led to discern the spiritual truths that are packed into each story.

How to Use and Teach "People Who Knew Jesus"

The Bible study series, People Who Knew Jesus, has been used very successfully. Several reasons for this success: Each lesson is based on a true life story from the Bible; the student is lead to discover truths for himself; gospel invitations are given at the end of lessons five and six but are given in such a way the person is challenged to receive Christ but is not forced to say "yes" or "no" to Christ at that time.

HOW TO TEACH OTHERS: The secret to teaching these lessons is to lead the students to discover the truth for themselves. A student is asked to read the first paragraph of the study, then another to read the second, a third to read John 1:6-7 which is printed in the study. The next person is asked to read question one with its three choices. Then, the teacher says, "Please mark your answer while I read for you again the verse." After the verse is read, the teacher asks the person who read aloud the question, "What is your answer?" Each student is asked to read their answer. The teacher will ask, "Are we all in agreement?" The teacher does not tell them that their answer is right or wrong but goes to the next verse.

What if a person gives the wrong answer? The teacher doesn't act surprised or say in any way that the answer is wrong. Have each student to read their answer. The teacher says, "This is interesting. We have a difference of opinion. Let's read the verse again and you decide as a group which answer is the best and why you think so. The group will correct the person who made the mistake. This tells them that the group is the authority and not the teacher.

The order is always the following: (1) a student reads the verse aloud, (2) a second student reads the question and possible answers, (3) the teacher asks the students to mark their answer as he or she reads again the verse, (4) students read their answers, which are usually the same. Then the group goes to the next verse.

Sometimes, a student will not read their answer but will say, "The same." When that happens the teacher should say, "Thank you, but please read your answer."

The teacher does not do a lot of talking or explaining. They are to simply lead the group through the verses and questions. The wiser we are, the more we will encourage our students to make these discoveries. When they have really important questions, they will listen to us with great respect when we try to answer them in simple and unassuming ways.

If there are people who have difficulty reading, we do not ask them to read, but we may ask them to take part in answering the questions, especially those that are brief and usually after one or two others have read their answer.

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Lesson 2

The Samaritan Woman

Many criticized Jesus for being a friend of sinners. He declared that He *"came to seek and to save the lost."* Luke 19:10

Jesus spoke to sinners with love and patience. That way they realized how much they needed a Savior to save them from their sins and to give them salvation as a gift.

In the fourth chapter of John, we find Jesus having a conversation with a woman of bad reputation. What Jesus told her is of great importance for each one of us since *"everyone has sinned and is far away from God's saving presence."* Romans 3:23

Bible Text: John 4:4-29, 39-42

John 4:4-6. On his way there he had to go through Samaria. In Samaria he came to a town named Sychar, which was not far from the field that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired out by the trip, sat down by the well. It was about noon.

1. The Bible indicates that:

- □ Jesus was a rich man and traveled in luxury.
- □ Jesus was a real man who got tired.

John 4:7-9. A Samaritan woman came to draw some water, and Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink of water." (His disciples had gone into town to buy food.) The woman answered, "You are a Jew, and I am a Samaritan ----- so how can you ask me for a drink?" (Jews refuse to have anything to do with Samaritans.)

2. Discussion: Why did the woman act surprised when Jesus asked her for a drink?

John 4:10. Jesus answered, "If you only knew what God gives and who it is that is asking you for a drink, you would ask him, and he would give you life-giving water."

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3. What did Jesus say He could give her?

John 4:11-12. *"Sir," the woman said, "you don't have a bucket, and the well is deep. Where would you get that life-giving water? It was our ancestor Jacob who gave us this well; he and his sons and his flocks all drank from it. You don't claim to be greater than Jacob, do you?"*

4. This woman thought Jesus spoke of: □ natural water □ eternal life

John 4:13-14. Jesus answered, "Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water that I will give him, will never be thirsty again. The water that I will give him will become in him a spring which will provide him with life-giving water and give him eternal life."

John 4:15-19. "Sir," the woman said, "give me that water! Then I will never be thirsty again, nor will I have to come here to draw water." "Go and call your husband," Jesus told her, "and come back." You have been married to five men, and the man you live with now is not really your husband. You have told me the truth." "Sir," the woman said, "I can see that you are a prophet."

6. Opinions: Why did Jesus ask the woman to bring her husband?

John 4:20-24. "My Samaritan ancestors worshiped God on this mountain, but you Jews say that Jerusalem is the place where we should worship God." God is Spirit and his worshipers must worship in spirit and in truth."

Lesson 3

The Hungry Multitude

During the earthly life of our Lord Jesus, many followed Him because of His miracles and the material benefit they hoped to receive from Him. Sadly, many did not follow Christ because they loved Him, but because they hoped that they might receive some material benefit from Him. Spiritual life, eternal life, is for those who love Jesus Christ and are willing to give their lives to Him. The true Christian is not just a person who follows the crowd, even when the crowd shows interest in religion. This is revealed in the Bible event which you will now study.

Bible Text: John 6:1-15, 25-31, 35, 40-41 and 67-69

John 6:1-2. After this, Jesus went across Lake Galilee (or Lake Tiberias, as it is also called). A large crowd followed him, because they had seen his miracles of healing the sick.

1. Discussion: Why were many people following Jesus?

John 6:3-5. Jesus went up a hill and sat down with his disciples. The time for the Passover Festival was near. Jesus looked around and saw that a large crowd was coming to him, so he asked Philip, "Where can we buy enough food to feed all these people?"

2. After Jesus had taught the crowd:

- He thought He could make some extra money by selling them a lunch.
- □ He wanted to feed them because He felt concerned for them.

John 6:6-9. (He said this to test Philip; he already knew what he would do.) Philip answered, "For everyone to have even a little, it would take more than two hundred silver coins to buy enough bread." Another one of his disciples, Andrew, who was Simon Peter's brother, said, "There is a boy here who has five loaves of barley bread and two fish. But they will certainly not be enough for all these people."

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3. Discussion: What problems did Phillip and Andrew put forth which made them think it was impossible to feed the multitude?

John 6:10-15. "Make the people sit down," Jesus told them. (There was a lot of grass there.) So all the people sat down; there were about five thousand men. Jesus took the bread, gave thanks to God, and distributed it to the people who were sitting there. He did the same with the fish, and they all had as much as they wanted. When they were all full, he said to his disciples, "Gather the pieces left over; let us not waste a bit." So they gathered them all and filled twelve baskets with the pieces left over from the five barley loaves which the people had eaten. Seeing this miracle that Jesus had performed, the people there said, "Surely this is the prophet who was to come into the world!" Jesus knew that they were about to come and seize him in order to make him king by force; so he went off again to the hills by himself.

Our ancestors ate manna in the desert, just as the Scripture says, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.""

Lesson 4

The Man Who Was Born Blind

Jesus told those who were hungry, "I am the bread of life"

(John 6:35). Shortly afterwards, He said, *"I am the light of the world"* (John 9:5). Light is only of value to those who have sight. Jesus came to give sight to those who were physically blind. He also came to give spiritual sight to those of us who were spiritually blind.

In the following biblical account, we shall see that the men who we would most expect to have spiritual sight, the religious leaders, were the most blind of all. We shall see the case of a physically blind man who not only received the sight of his eyes, but also spiritual sight. Jesus Christ, the "light of the world," gives spiritual sight to all who desire it and ask it of Him.

Bible Text: John 9:1-17, 24-25, 28-38

John 9:1-5. As Jesus was walking along, he saw a man who had been born blind. His disciples asked him, "Teacher, whose sin caused him to be born blind? Was it his own or his parent's sin?" Jesus answered, "His blindness has nothing to do with his sins or his parents' sins. He is blind so that God's power might be seen at work in him. As long as it is day, we must do the work of him who sent me; night is coming when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

1. Your Opinion: Why did Jesus identify Himself with light, saying, "I am the light of the world"?

John 9:6-7. After he said this, Jesus spat on the ground and made some mud with the spittle; he rubbed the mud on the man's eyes and told him, "Go and wash your face in the pool of Siloam." (This name means "sent.") So the man went, washed his face, and came back seeing.

2. Discussion: What strange cure did Jesus use to give sight to the blind man? Did He give any instructions to the blind man? What was the result?

John 9:8-9. *His neighbors, then, and the people who had seen him begging before this, asked, "Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?" Some said, "He is the one," but others said, "No he isn't; he just looks like him."*

3. How did the people express their doubts about the miracles?

- □ They said that it was simply a trick.
- □ They said that it was just a man who looked like the blind man.

John 9:10-12. "How is it that you can now see?" they asked him. He answered, "The man called Jesus made some mud, rubbed it on my eyes, and told me to go to Siloam and wash my face. So I went and as soon as I washed, I could see." "Where is he?" they asked. "I don't know," he answered.

4. The blind man told them that:

- a man called Jesus had healed him.
- □ he had cured himself.

John 9:13-16. Then they took to the Pharisees the man who had been blind. The day that Jesus made the mud and cured him of his blindness was a Sabbath. The Pharisees, then, asked the man again how he had received his sight. He told them, "He put some mud on my eyes; I washed my face, and now I can see." Some of the Pharisees said, "The man who did this cannot be from God, for he does not obey the Sabbath law."

5. Some of the religious leaders, known as Pharisees, said that Jesus could not be from God because:

- □ Jesus lived a sinful life.
- □ Jesus had healed the blind man on the Sabbath (Saturday), breaking the Jewish tradition.

John 9:17. So the Pharisees asked the man once more, "You say he cured you of your blindness ----- well, what do you say about him?" "He is a prophet," the man answered.

6. In verse 11, the blind man referred to Jesus as the "man." Now he refers to Him as a



John 9:24-25. A second time they called back the man who had been born blind, and said to him, "Promise before God that you will tell the truth! We know that this man who cured you is a sinner." "I do not know if he is a sinner or not," the man replied. "One thing I do know. I was blind, and now I see."

- 7. The man who had been blind said that he knew only one thing:
- □ he knew all about Jesus Christ.

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Lesson 5

Nicodemus: A Religious Leader



How does a person receive eternal life? The world is very confused. Many believe that eternal life

is for all who have been faithful to their religion. Others think that eternal life, if it exists, is like a prize for those who have lived fairly good lives in this world. How can we know the truth?

We know that what Jesus says is the truth. In the following study, we shall see the surprise of a good moral man, a religious leader, when Jesus explained to him that heaven is only for those who have experienced a spiritual birth. Jesus went on to explain how we could be born spiritually and receive eternal life, something that can and should be experienced by everyone.

Bible Text: John 3:1-18 and 36

John 3:1-2. There was a Jewish leader named Nicodemus, who belonged to the party of the Pharisees. One night he went to Jesus and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher sent by God. No one can perform the miracles you are doing unless God were with him."

1. What is your opinion of Nicodemus? Was he very religious? Did he respect and admire Jesus? Why did he visit Jesus after dark?

John 3:3. Jesus answered, "I am telling you the truth: no one can see the Kingdom of God unless he is born again."

2. Jesus:

- □ thanked Nicodemus for his kind words.
- $\hfill\square$ warned Nicodemus that unless one is "born again" he cannot be saved.

John 3:4. "How can a grown man be born again?" Nicodemus asked. "He certainly cannot enter his mother's womb and be born a second time!"

John 3:14-15. As Moses lifted up the bronze snake on a pole in the desert, in the same way the Son of Man must be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life.

(See Numbers 21:9 to learn more about the bronze snake.)

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John 3:16. For God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him may not die but have eternal life.

Lesson 6

The Unbelieving Disciples



Many times Jesus told his disciples that it was necessary that He die at the hands of His enemies, but

that He would arise from the dead. Even so, the disciples were unable to understand or believe what He told them. Therefore, when Jesus died on the cross, His followers lost all hope.

Even when Jesus rose from the dead on the third day, according to His promise, the disciples continued to disbelieve. Only when Jesus physically presented Himself to them could they believe that He had overcome the power of death.

Jesus has promised very special blessings to those who believe in Him without having seen Him. The great truth is that Jesus Christ is alive and *"is able, now and always, to save those who come to God through Him, because He lives forever to plead with God for them."* Hebrews 7:25

Bible Text: John 20:1-21, 24-31

John 20:1-2. Early on Sunday morning, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been taken away from the entrance. She went running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!"

1. When Mary Magdalene reported to the disciples, she thought:

- □ that someone had stolen Jesus' body.
- □ that surely Jesus had risen from the dead.

John 20:3-7. Then Peter and the other disciple went to the tomb. The two of them were running, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent over and saw the linen clothes, but he did not go in. Behind him came Simon Peter, and he went straight into the tomb. He saw the linen clothes lying there and the cloth which had been around Jesus' head. It was not lying with the linen clothes but was rolled up by itself.

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2. Discussion: What were the signs that indicated Jesus had risen from the dead?

John 20:8-10. Then the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went in; he saw and believed. (They still did not understand the scripture which said that he must rise from death.) Then the disciples went back home.

3. The two disciples:

- □ still did not understand the Old Testament prophecies that Jesus had to rise from the dead.
- □ looked for Jesus' body in the tombs.

John 20:11-13. Mary stood crying outside the tomb. While she was still crying, she bent over and looked in the tomb and saw two angels there dressed in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been, one at the head and the other at the feet. "Woman, why are you crying?" they asked her. She answered, "They have taken my Lord away, and I do not know where they have put him!"

4. Discussion: Did Mary believe yet that Jesus had arisen? What proof is there that she loved Jesus Christ?

John 20:14-15. Then she turned around and saw Jesus standing there; but she did not know it was Jesus. "Woman, why are you crying?" Jesus asked her, "Who is it that you are looking for?" She thought he was the gardener, so she said to him, "If you took him away, sir, tell me where you have put him, and I will go and get him."

5. Mary Magdalene:

- immediately recognized Jesus.
- personally offered to carry away Jesus' body if it were given to her.

John 20:16-18. Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned toward him and said in Hebrew, "Rabboni!" (This means "teacher.") "Do not hold on to me," Jesus told her, "because I have not yet gone back up to the Father. But go to my brothers and tell them that I am returning to him who is my Father and their Father, my God and their God." So Mary Magdalene went and told the disciples that she had seen the Lord and related to them what he had told her.



6. Mark the right answers.

John 20:19-20. It was late that Sunday evening, and the disciples were gathered together behind locked doors, because they were afraid of the Jewish authorities. Then Jesus came and stood among them. "Peace be with you," he said. After saying this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy at seeing the Lord.

7. Discussion: How did Jesus finally prove to his disciples that He had truly risen from the dead?

John 20:21. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father sent me, so I send you."

8. Jesus now commissioned his followers, saying, "As the Father sent me, so _____

John 20:24-25. One of the twelve disciples, Thomas (called the Twin), was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!" Thomas said to them, "Unless I see the scars of the nails in his hands and put my finger on those scars and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

9. Thomas said that he:

- could not believe, unless he himself could see and touch the body of Jesus.
- □ believed everything the disciples told him about Jesus' resurrection.

John 20:26-27. A week later the disciples were together again indoors, and Thomas was with them. The doors were locked, but Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and look at my hands; then reach out your hand and put it in my side. Stop your doubting and believe!"

10. Your opinions: Why did Jesus return: to condemn Thomas for his lack of faith or to help Thomas to believe? Why do you think so?

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John 20:28. Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!"

11. Then, Thomas:

- □ asked to examine Jesus' wounds.
- □ confessed Jesus as his King and God.

John 20:29. Jesus said to him, "Do you believe because you see me? How happy are those who believe without seeing me!"

12. Discussion: For whom did Jesus promise a special blessing?

John 20:30-31. In his disciples' presence Jesus performed many other miracles which are not written down in this book. But these have been written in order that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through your faith in him you may have life.

13. The book of John is written in order that:

- u we might be better philosophers.
- u we might have eternal life, trusting only in Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior.
